

## Apostles Peter and Paul

These apostles share a feast as founders of the church in Rome. Peter, a Galilean fisherman chosen by Christ as one of the Twelve Apostles, became the undisputed leader of the fledgling church after Pentecost. Paul, a Pharisee and Roman citizen who had persecuted Christians, became after his dramatic conversion the church's greatest missionary, its "apostle of the gentiles." By tradition both were martyred in Rome. Their adventures are recounted in the Acts of the Apostles, and letters from them are included in the New Testament.

# Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear parish family,

Peace be with you!

Having celebrated the solemnity of the most Holy Body and Blood of Christ last weekend the church liturgical calendar informs us that we are finished with the Easter Season and the special festival season that follows after it and now have entered into the Ordinary season. Talking about Ordinary Season, we are reminded that this is the season to out-show the impacts of all the celebrations we had such as the Easter, Pentecost, Trinity and the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. This is the season which demands us to demonstrate the changes we have made in our personal and spiritual lives by the inspirations of those celebrations. This Ordinary Season gives us a loud call not to fall back to our former ways of sins and flaws but to a newer and enhanced way of living our faith.

This weekend we celebrate the “Thirteenth week in Ordinary Time and the first reading of this weekend brings to us a powerful character from the Bible that is prophet “Elisha”. Elisha served the nation of Israel as a prophet for approximately 60 years. He was involved in two of the three Old Testament resurrections and was a forerunner of Christ in many of the things he did, he performed more miracles than anyone else, except for Jesus. Elisha was chosen by God to be a successor to Elijah, and in 1 Kings 19 we read of his calling, and one of the rare occasions we hear of the anointing of prophets. So Elijah leaves and searches out Elisha to be his successor in v19. Elisha was found by Elijah ploughing the ground with his 12 yoke of oxen, what seemed like a peaceful untroubled life. So how does he respond to the call of Elijah? It is obvious he understood fully the extent of this call. He gives his answer in that he said goodbye to his parents, took a yoke of his oxen and sacrificed them, using the ploughing instruments as wood for the fire, and gave the meat for food, then left all behind and followed Elijah. He left that everything that was holding him back from following God more closely, he sacrificed his livelihood to follow God intimately and passionately. we see a powerful lesson for us through his sacrifice. Friends, we are given opportunity every day to try and love God and follow him in everything we do. Will we have the strength to follow our master in everything we do? Will we follow him into times of suffering or torment like Elisha?

Or will we waver and even intent to become mean and wicked when the going gets tough like John and James in the gospel who wanted the fire and brimstone to come upon the Samaritans who were not ready to accept Jesus and His disciples? In the gospel of this weekend, we hear that Jesus rebuked the apostles who tried to return evil for evil. He showed the way of great and beautiful life for those who intent to be of His own. He set them free from evil as we hear in the second reading of this weekend. Now the question for us is that what we are going to do? As we are entering into the Ordinary season of the liturgical calendar, are we going to go back to our former ways of pitfalls and filths or are we going to embrace a life filled with the beauties that our Lord has shown us through His death and resurrection, the lives of the great people of Bible like prophet Elisha? May the Lord help us to out-show the impacts of all the celebrations we did following “Easter”! let us have the pride to live our faith! God bless us all!

## CELEBRATE JOHN THE BAPTIST'S FEAST WITH HONEY CHICKEN

### We're Skipping the Locusts...

When we think of John the Baptist, we visualize an unkempt man living in the wilderness, fasting on locusts and wild honey, proclaiming dire warnings of repentance to all who would listen. But of course we know he was so much more. The Gospels describe a prophet who was sent to prepare the way for Jesus' coming and for his ministry here on earth.

"The people of Jerusalem and the Judean countryside would flock to him to be baptized. During his ministry, he gave witness to holiness and purity, and publicly condemned immorality in all forms. He was humble and understood his role of paving the way for others to follow Jesus: "One mightier than I is coming after me. I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; he will baptize you with the holy Spirit." (Mk 1:7-8)

John followed a life of simplicity and poverty, which would explain his diet while living in the wilderness. I've often wondered why locusts and honey, but I'm going to skip the locust part for obvious reasons and jump right to the honey.

Honey is mentioned more than 60 times in the Bible, and we know today that raw honey is replete with health benefits. It has antiviral and antibacterial properties, and is an excellent source of antioxidants.

Perhaps this is what helped sustain John in the wilderness. But since it's also known to aid in detoxing the body of impurities and healing wounds, I can't help but consider it a spiritual metaphor for John's ministry – helping people heal the wounds of sin and purify their hearts through baptism.

Our family loves honey since it is a healthier alternative to sugar, but

mostly because it is so wonderful tasting! We like it in baked treats and even add it to some of our savory dishes too, including the following recipe which is a favorite during the summer months. This dish would be a great addition to celebrating the feast of the Nativity of John the Baptist, which is June 24, but celebrated June 23 this year because June 24 has been declared the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus.

### Honey Garlic Grilled Chicken

4-6 chicken breasts  
½ cup honey  
½ cup olive oil  
½ cup soy sauce  
1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar  
1 tablespoon Dijon mustard  
4-5 cloves garlic (minced)  
1 tablespoon brown sugar  
salt and pepper to taste  
2 sprigs rosemary (chopped)

In a small mixing bowl, whisk together all listed ingredients. Poke a few fork holes in each chicken breast and place in a large zip lock bag. Pour 2/3 of the marinade over the chicken and store the remaining in an airtight container in fridge. Place the chicken in fridge overnight (or marinate for at least 6 hours).

Heat grill or a grill pan to medium-high heat. Remove the container of remaining honey garlic glaze and chicken breasts from the fridge. Remove chicken from bag and let excess marinade drip off before placing on grill/grill pan. Cook for 6-7 minutes on one side. Flip over and continue to cook. After 2-3 minutes, heavily baste on the remaining glaze and cook for an additional 2-3 minutes (or until chicken reaches an internal temperature of 165 degrees).
